Sustainable Solutions

The 2010 theme for TMG Winter School is “Sustainable Solutions.” Words like “sustainable,” “organic” and “environmental” are often clichéd but we felt that these were the best words to describe our vision for the Winter School program. Winter School is broken down into two tracks: 1) educational track to train MG in garden-related programming and 2) leadership track to concentrate on coaching for leaders. The TMG Advocacy Board has developed an excellent program for 2010. This year we are privileged to have some outstanding speakers on topics and issues recommended by participants of last year’s Winter School. We hope you all take advantage of this wonderful opportunity to learn and meet new friends. **Pre-registration required by February 9.**

Winter School is open for all Master Gardeners and Extension personnel. Tracks are separate rather than concurrent to allow leaders to participate in education and educators to participate in leadership activities. MG and agents have a choice to participate in only one track if desired. Pre-registration is required for each track so there are enough supplies and refreshments for all participants.

The Tennessee Yards and Neighborhoods Program is a full delivery program for Extension offices and local water resources folks to partner on educating the public on better landscape management practices. Several of MG counties have been piloting this program and Master Gardener participation is essential to the program’s potential success. You may attend this workshop without attending the full Winter School, but you must register for the opportunity. This workshop is sponsored by the Tennessee Water Resources Research Center.
